



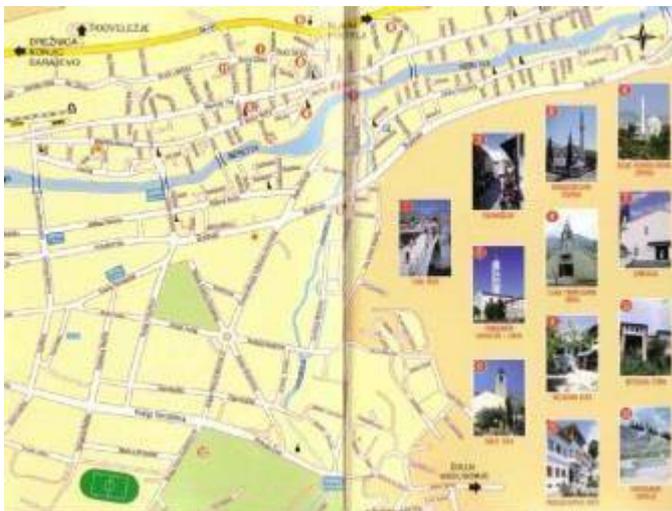

World War One postcard in the nine languages of the Austro-Hungarian Empire that was sent by soldiers to inform loved ones they were still alive

In the nine languages it reads:

“I am healthy and I am well.”

“It is forbidden to add other text to this postcard.”
